The Shechina is a Talmudic term for the personification and manifestation of the essential nature of God's 'Indwelling' or 'Presence' in the world. The notion that God dwells in the physical world necessitates a dwelling place. To understand how the Shechina came to symbolise the inner Temple, or in Jungian terms, the 'Self', Edna will place it in its historical context.

Edna Shahaf is a Jungian analyst (IGAP, IAAP, UKCP). She lives in London and was born and raised in Israel to a family of Persian storytellers tracing back through several generations. She has a degree in Literature and History of Art and has spent many years studying, researching and writing about Toledano Kabbalah.
